Among his many positions, Rose was the president of the Jewish Community Council and the Council for Jews and Christians, vice president of the Bayonne Hospital Foundation and the Jewish Old-Age Home, chairman of the Industrial Commission, vice chairman of the Bayonne Housing and Rehabilitation Authority, and counsel to the Bayonne Planning Board.

Rose retired in 1992, at the young age of 79, after decades of contributing to the community that he loved.

Rose said that when Sept. 11 rolls around, his two children, seven grandchildren and four great-grandchildren will be helping him celebrate his 100th birthday, which is another in a long list of impressive accomplishments.
